**What is Gala Day?** Gala day is an opportunity for Year 6 students to organise a fun event for the Wentworthville community. Below is some information about the day.

**When is Gala Day?** Gala day will be held Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> November, 2018. The event will start at 11:35am and conclude at 1:35pm. This will be followed by the Gala day raffle, drawn at 1:45pm.

**Who can attend Gala Day?** Wentworthville P.S. students along with family and friends are welcome to attend and enjoy the activities at Gala day whilst supporting our Year 6 students.

#### How Gala Day works:

- Students purchase tokens prior to and on the day of Gala day to play games
- Students use the tokens to play over 30 different games run by Year 6 students
- Activities include **3 jumping castles**, face painting, henna art drawing competitions, an obstacle course, soccer shootout, footy passing and plenty of water activities
- We have giant size board games including giant jenga, giant connect four and giant dominos
- This year we will have a disco running during the Gala day in the hall
- Year six students and local community companies provide prizes for students to win at each stall
- Best off all, you are guaranteed to win prizes at each activity you play
- To play games students purchase 'Gala day' tokens
- Tokens are **50c each or 5 for \$2**
- Activities cost one or two tokens per game, the jumping castle will cost 3 tokens per turn. Students purchase tokens to play the activities. All money raised through playing games on the day goes towards the Year 6 Farewell and the Year 6 gift to the school, benefiting all students at Wentworthville P.S.









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How many tokens does my child need? We recommend each student purchase around **\$10** worth of tokens; as this is a two-hour event allowing students to play for the whole two hours.

When can I purchase tokens? You can purchase tokens in the morning from 8:25am till 8:55am, starting on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> November, 2018. Just look for the Gala Day token counter located in the morning playground area. You can also purchase tokens on the day and during Gala Day.

## Year Six Gala Day Raffle Tuesday 20th November 1.45pm

The Gala Day raffle will be drawn at 1:45pm (Conclusion of Gala day).

How to enter: You will receive tickets into the raffle through purchasing Gala Day tokens.

Any student who purchases **\$5** worth of Gala Day tokens will receive one raffle ticket, if you purchase \$10 you will receive 3 raffle tickets (maximum is 3 raffle tickets per person).



### Travelling or taking holidays during the school term

Since 2015 family holidays and travel are no longer considered under the exemption from school procedures. Travel outside of the vacation period is now counted as an absence for statistical purposes.

Parents are required to complete the application for extended leave, which is available from the school office and website. This form must be submitted at the front office prior to travel for principal consideration.



The principal will not accept a reason for travel during the school term if it is not in the best interests of the student. Educational, social and participation reasons should be specified on the application.

Travel is considered to be domestic or international travel for the purpose of a family holiday, family business, bereavement or other reasons, which should be specified on the application.

If the principal considers that the travel is appropriate during the school term, the principal will inform the parent if the application is accepted. The absences will then be recorded as 'L'- Leave. The absences will be recorded on your child's report.

All travel documentation, such as travel itinerary or e-ticket must be attached to the application.

The principal may decline an application for Extended Leave -Travel and the parent will be informed of this in writing. The absence will then be recorded as unjustified and will appear on your child's report.



# Why developing empathy in your child matters

Parenting is a socialisation process during which parents develop in their children and teenagers the skills and attitudes that will enable them to fit into the different groups they encounter. These groups will exist inside the classroom, in friendship groups, during sports and leisure activities and elsewhere.

This socialisation process needs to begin from a young age.

Initially, most kids believe that their world and everyone in it revolves around them. "I want" is their mantra. Patient, firm parents will continually remind children that they need to think of others. "It's your brother's turn.""Nana doesn't feel comfortable listening to that language." "Think about how your behaviour affects others." These are the types of appeal to a less self-centred approach that many parents make.

The socialisation process operates on two levels. On one level its focus is on teaching and helping kids to follow social rules or conventions that exist to help them get along with each other. At a deeper level successful socialisation develops empathy in a child or young person.

Empathy – the ability to understand how another person is feeling or how they respond to a behaviour or an event – is the basis of all respectful relationships. Without empathy it's impossible for someone to enjoy a relationship based on respect and equality. It's easy for a person who doesn't practise empathy to reject, bully, intimidate or hurt someone else.

#### Empathy learned in childhood carries on to adult life

Empathetic adults enjoy better personal relationships and experience less stress. They also make better leaders who are more likely to get the best out of people than self-centred, result-focused leaders.

Anecdotal evidence suggests that empathy, if neglected in childhood, can be difficult to develop in adulthood. In some adults it takes a traumatic event or a 'road-to-Damascus' moment for them to adopt an empathetic perspective.

So, rather than wait until adulthood, let's focus on developing empathy in your children and adolescents. There is a good chance they will benefit very soon in terms of enjoying better friendships, improved wellbeing and more success at school. Here are five ideas to get you started:

## parenting **\***ideas

- 1. Model empathetic behaviour. Be kind even though the person in front of you in that queue is slow.
- 2. Read fiction stories to kids or encourage them to read fiction. People who read fiction score highest on tests that ask them to infer other people's thoughts and emotions.
- 3. Praise kind and compassionate behaviours. The behaviours that parents focus on, even with teenagers, are those that tend to expand, so bring their empathetic behaviours to the fore.
- 4. Validate your child's feelings. When a child shares difficult stories or emotions let them know you understand, without offering solutions or advice.
- 5. Invite your child to walk in someone else's shoes. Occasionally ask your child a question like, "What would it be like to be feel tall like Tanya?"

Empathy is too important to wait until adulthood so make it a priority to develop a sense of 'other' in your child from an early age.
