Investing in our schools

The NSW Government is investing \$6.7 billion over the next four years to deliver more than 190 new and upgraded schools to support communities across NSW. In addition, a record \$1.3 billion is being spent on school maintenance over five years. This is the largest investment in public education infrastructure in the history of NSW.

Wentworthville Public School

A project is underway to upgrade Wentworthville Public School. The project will deliver:

- 31 new permanent learning spaces
- a new hall and library
- a new special education area
- new administration and staff facilities
- new special program rooms.

Project summary

The State Significant Development application has been approved by the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment.

The construction contract has been awarded to Grindley Construction, who are preparing to commence the project.

Next steps

The contractor has begun site establishment for the first stage of the project. Next steps include bulk excavation works.

The out of hours school care club (OSH Club) will be temporarily relocated into the hall located in A Block for the duration of construction.

Keep updated

Regular updates will be provided to the school and local community throughout construction.

Thank you for your patience while we deliver this important school infrastructure, to meet future growth in the area.

Frequently asked questions

When will construction be completed?

The project will be delivered in three stages, and is scheduled for completion in mid 2021.

What safety measures are in place?

The safety of the school's students, staff and the local community is our highest priority.

Construction planning has been designed so there is minimal impact on school operations. Safety measures such as hoardings, signage and separate access points are in place to ensure students are not able to enter the construction site.

To minimise disruption to school operations and activities, site deliveries are being scheduled outside of school drop off and pick up times and traffic control personnel are on site to assist with contractor deliveries.

What are the scheduled work hours?

Work will take place during approved hours between 7am and 6pm, Monday to Friday and 8am and 1pm on Saturdays.

Will there be changes to how the school is accessed?

To enable construction to run smoothly and safely the below changes will be in place:

- Fullagar Road Gates 3, 4 and 5 will be closed
- Station Street Gate 6 will be closed
- Monash Street Gate 7 will be used as the Temporary OSHC gate

All other gates are available to use as per normal.

How will traffic be managed?

Construction vehicle movements and deliveries will be scheduled outside of peak school operation times.

Traffic management will be in place where required to manage vehicles entering and exiting the site in a safe manner.

How will you keep us informed during construction?

School infrastructure NSW will continue to share construction updates and project information as the project progresses. We will keep the school and local community informed through project notifications, information booths, school newsletters, drop-in sessions and website updates.

How will you minimise disruption to normal school operations during construction?

School Infrastructure NSW is working closely with the principal and staff to ensure that school operations continue with minimal disruption.




What is an Innovative Learning Environment?

Build on what already works and seeks to make it better – that's innovation! Quality teaching, smart use of flexible space and access to the right technology at the right time provides students with greater choice in how they demonstrate their learning. Innovative learning environments (or ILEs) are designed to help students develop skills critical to thrive in an increasingly complex world. Innovative learning environments are flexible so that teachers can design a wide range of learning activities to develop the skills and knowledge of students. They offer a range of furniture from seated desks to standing tables, whiteboard surfaces and shared tables and these support teachers in working with the whole class, in small groups or one on one in an engaging and welcoming space. So, an ILE offers a lot of what we've always done with the entire class but offers more options for small group and independent work in a modern environment. In fact, research has shown that the physical design of a classroom can result in significant improvements in students' learning (1).



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This term in science, the students in KD are completing a unit of work called "Move It!" They have had a lot of fun learning about force and motion and the different ways in which people, animals and objects move.



The students worked in small groups to make ramps and experimented to see the different ways objects from around the classroom moved (or didn't move!) down the ramp. This information was then recorded in their science books and shared with the rest of the class. We had some great discussions about the effects of friction and gravity.



The students are applying their knowledge of force and motion to help them design and make a toy that moves. They have worked collaboratively with a partner to draw a design of the toy and are now looking forward to making their toys using recycled materials. They have come up with some very clever ideas!

1D students are learning to write a narrative from a different character's point of view. They worked together to create a performance from the book them work together to create a performance of one of the popular children stories "The Three Little Pigs". Students played the roles of the three little pigs, the mother pig, and the wolf. The students improvised the props from around the classroom and used tissues for straw, rulers for sticks and Duplo block for bricks and a broken bucket as a chimney.



The mother pig telling the three little pigs it was time for them to be on their own. The pigs buying straw, sticks and bricks and building their house.











The big bad wolf huffs and puffs their house down and when he could not blow the brick house down, he tries to climb down the chimney and falls into the cauldron below.

There was plenty of laughter and cheering from the audience and they thoroughly enjoyed the performance. Each character then wrote the story from their chosen character's point of view.

In maths they learnt multiplication using a collection of objects to make equal groups.





In science they worked in groups and conducted an experiment on light energy. They used water, a torch and a mirror for this experiment. They took turns to shine the light into the water where the mirror is under water adjusting the angle until a rainbow appeared! They understood that light bends when it passes through different mediums, like glass or water.









Reflections



ICT 2019 with 5/6B was a thrilling, as well as an educational, experience. In the span of one and a half terms, our class has been taught a variety of skills and practices. Mrs Gojkovic has showcased to us a variation of games, such as: Zimmer Twins, Graffiti Creator, Wimp your Family and Pixel Art. Although these games do not have the standard names of the expected educational games, they have conveyed to us a series of skills and understandings. These games have brought to life an exhilarating way to enjoy the everyday schooling we receive.

Games such as Zimmer Twins, helped us to understand the base of filmmaking, and brought our creativity to life with the help of our own imagination. Graffiti Creator allowed us to create artwork, while still learning to use certain devices to manipulate





and add liveliness to our work. Learning things such as: how to create simple, yet appealing works of art, and how to edit them. Wimp your

Family was similar in some way to Graffiti Creator, as it yet again, allowed us to express ourselves in art, while also learning different skills. Designing and customising our work at our own will, while using advanced tools to help us. Finally, Pixel Art, which was easily the most pleasant experience, as well as learning many different abilities. As well as creating our own artwork, we learnt how to use coordinates and how to use Microsoft Excel.

We learnt to create graphs and tables, while still having fun.

Overall, ICT 2019, with 5/6B and Mrs Gojkovic was nothing less than a terrific time. While gaining the required skills for the year, we learnt them in many different ways, which,



frankly, we enjoyed more than the normal course of action. We would

appreciate this method of learning to continue throughout the next few years, as it is the reason we look forward to Tuesdays every week. We appreciate the opportunity given to us, as not all classes were given this possibility and we hope every student for the years to come will look forward to ICT as much as we did.

Unexplained Absences 2019

There are still many outstanding unexplained absences for 2019.

It is a Department of Education requirement that all absences are explained the day your child returns from an absence. When your child is absent you will receive an automated email from Sentral on the day of the absence informing you your child was absent and that their absence needs to be explained.

To check if your child has unexplained absences please log into your Sentral Parent Portal or use the app. There will be a list of unexplained absences and corresponding dates. Click explanation and write the absence reason and then click submit. This will then be actioned by the office the following day. Alternatively you can supply a written note which is sent to the class teacher.

All outstanding unexplained absences need to be completed prior to the end of Term 4.

Protecting your child's online privacy

From sharing pictures of a child's first day at school to key moments at high school, many adults don't consider the potential risks or breach of future privacy for kids. In fact, it is now become a ritual to announce the full name and date of birth of a child online within hours of them being born. This is just the beginning of a child's digital footprint.

Although children are now 'born digital', exposure in the online world can present just as many risks as the physical world can pose. Images and identifying details can be used for numerous activities that put your child at risk, from stalking, to cyberbullying, identity theft, and even digital kidnapping.

The Australian eSafety Commission warns that half of all images on paedophile image-sharing sites originate from social media sites and blogs. Parents are responsible for protecting kids until they are old enough to make their own decisions about their online presence.

So, what can parents do?

Start by 'thinking privacy' before posting images of children online. You'll be protecting their digital footprint and setting them up for a healthy relationship with the digital world.

Seek consent

Always ask others before sharing images of their children, even your family. Speak up about how you feel about images of your child being shared. When your child is old enough, ask them for consent, empowering them to understand they have a right to their privacy online. As they become teenagers, hopefully they will have more respect for what they post online and have confidence to speak to others about their consent guidelines.

Understand the settings

Check the settings of your social media channels to ensure your posts are not public. Speak to your friends and family about this and don't be afraid to ask for help to get it right. If your child has social media channels of their own, go through the settings with them to minimise the risk of unwanted shares.

Think about the detail

Avoid including children's identifiable details such as school badges, logos, uniforms, name tags or identifiable locations such as your home area or school. Alternatively, blur these details prior to posting.

Be selective


Create a simple checklist to help make decisions regarding posting online easy. What do you deem appropriate? Are you happy to share images of your children in swimwear? Do you want to avoid full-frontal face shots?

If your child is old enough, explain why you are selecting certain pictures and not sharing others. If you have a teenager who is sharing their own images, talk to them about what is appropriate and potential repercussions of not setting boundaries.

Remove metadata

Metadata on digital images records the time, date and GPS coordinates of where the photo was taken and can be accessed through shared images, and your sharing service may record your IP address. You can wipe this information with appropriate software or share screenshots of your photos to avoid metadata sharing. Screenshot sharing creates a lower resolution photo, so it's less likely to be tampered with by a third party.

Think 'privacy first' to reduce many of the risks involved with image sharing. Have conversations with your children to instil this mentality; help them build empathy; and identify the steps for minimising risk whilst helping them build a healthy relationship with technology so they can become responsible digital citizens.
