Wentworthville COVID Update

The Department of Education has continued to work with NSW Health to ease some restrictions due to COVID-19 for the remainder of Term 4. Below is a summary of how these changes will affect events scheduled throughout Term 4 at Wentworthville:

- A modified Kindergarten 2021 orientation process to occur;
- Parents are permitted on the school site for pre-scheduled meetings (only as approved by Principal);
- WPS presentation ceremonies will be held over a series of days under the COLA. Whilst the Department of Education has allowed functions of this type to go ahead, schools will need to comply with COVID-19 Safety Plans. As a result we have to limit family to one representative per award recipient and there will be a RSVP process prior to the event and a sign-in process on the day. The ceremonies will be held during the day. Further information will be sent home to parents later in the term by Ms Di Chio.
- Our Year 6 Farewell can occur at Wenty Leagues with changed operations to adhere to COVID-19 Safety
 Plans for the venue and for us to ensure we are in line with current restrictions.
- Our last day Year 6 assembly and end of day exit can occur within our COVID plan more information to come from Mrs Rafidi.
- WE STILL NEED TO MAINTAIN OUR STAGGERED DEPARTURE SCHEDULE via Gates 1, 9 and 10. Thank you parents for your patience and understanding of maintaining social distance and having your signs each day as it helps us move through the number of students departing the school in a smooth manner. More broadly, thank you for your ongoing support. As always, maximising the health and safety of the staff, students and community of WPS is a priority.

School Development Days 2021

The Department of Education has informed schools regarding a change to beginning of 2021 school year start dates. In support of a smooth start to the 2021 school year and to ensure that schools are able to give time to high impact professional learning for staff, the following amendments to School Development Days (SDDs) will take effect from the beginning of the 2021 school year.



- School Development Days Wednesday 27 and Thursday 28 January
- ♦ Wentworthville students return Friday 29 January 2021 (Years 1 6).
- All Kindergarten 2021 students will have their Best Start interview times during Friday January 29,
 Monday February 1 and Tuesday February 2.
- All children start Kindergarten for 2021 as a cohort on Wednesday February 3



Busy students at work during Literacy Boost - Phonics Groups







Students have been busy during Literacy Boost sessions this term. They have engaged in a range of activities to support their understanding of the individual sounds (phonemes) letters make.


They are also learning how to use this knowledge to say words. Students are developing their skills in broadening their automatic recognition of the Magic 100 words which is assisting them with their reading and writing, as is learning rhyming words through understanding the different word families.

They have also been busy using sound boxes as a tool to apply their growing phonemic awareness skills into spelling. They are really enjoying using the toobaloo to help them hear the different phonemes which together make up words.











4G students have been busy being engineers and creating their own shelters as part of their science projects. They have been working very hard to design and plan for a shelter. Using these plans they have started creating a 3D version of the shelter using a program called CoSpace. We are all very excited to see the completed projects.

The power of sorry



Our boys tend to get into trouble more than our girls. There are lots of cultural and biological reasons for this but much of it boils down to the fact that boys are still soft-wired to be 'mammoth hunters', ready to react to any threat.

Generally, boys have more muscle than girls and, with that, a physicality that gets them in strife. There's also brain research that shows that, while females tend to quickly shift emotions from the brain's limbic system to the word centres of the brain, males tend to shift them into their bodies.

This is more obvious as our boys become teens as they can be as big and strong as men, but their brains are under construction and their bodies are flooded with testosterone.

Author and counsellor Michael Gurian writes that boys tend to seek external measures of success to feel good about themselves. It is critical they maintain credibility and status in the eyes of the 'tribe'... that's their peers, not you.

Inevitably, all this means your son will probably make many mistakes; or hurt himself; hurt someone else; or make a very poor, thoughtless, seemingly stupid or cruel choice.

React with compassion not shame

How you react as a parent can significantly impact how your son recovers from mucking up. Your first reactions may be anger, disappointment or the urge to discipline harshly. However, there are other ways of reacting that can strengthen your bond with your son and ensure he learns from the experience through growth rather than shame.

Listen to him, guide him to see the impact of his poor choice, help him make it right, forgive him and ask him what he might do next time he's in the same situation.

Break down the old male-code

This code told us that men don't apologise as it's a sign of weakness. One of the most powerful things we can teach our boys is that when we make mistakes, we own up to them and we apologise if need be. Teach your boys that saying sorry when they really mean it is a sign of courage and strength, not the opposite. It is also about taking responsibility for your actions, which is important for boys to learn. They need to see the men in their lives – particularly dads – apologise.

Don't force an apology

Forcing a boy to apologise can be problematic. A genuine apology is very different to a forced apology. A genuine apology has a real sense of remorse attached to it. Coach your son to see the situation through the other person's eyes. If someone has been impacted, he needs to apologise and make amends even if he didn't intend for the consequences of his poor choice to happen. It doesn't mean he's wrong. It just means his choice affected someone.



Embrace failure

To help your son better learn about failure, have conversations about things you hear in the media where boys and men have experienced failure and recovered. Steve Smith, the former captain of the Australian cricket team who was involved in a ball-tampering scandal, is a great example. He owned his mistake, publicly apologised and he went on to have a very successful return to cricket.

Your son is going to make poor decisions repeatedly until he has enough myelin in his brain to be more mindful of the choices he makes. That is just a fact of life. As parents, your job is to, day-by-day, help your son learn a culture of accountability without a need for severe punishment, shaming or ridicule.
